Expect Respect


Universal Team Role

The universal team is the first level team in the PBIS system. The universal team's job is to meet bi-monthly to examine the school's referral data and discover trends. This is done by using SWIS data (SWIS data is data inputted into our computer system to track student referrals). Additionally, this team sets dates and plans school wide celebrations, redemption, keeps parents connected, and implements advisory activities and re-teaching of cool tools.

Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is a proactive systems approach to establishing the behavioral supports and social culture and needed for all students in a school to achieve social, emotional, and academic success.

As a Response to Intervention model, PBIS applies a three-tiered system of support, and a problem-solving process to enhance the capacity of schools to effectively educate all students.

Cool Tools

Cool Tools are behavioral lesson plans that structure how the staff teaches the expected behaviors from our school-wide Behavior Matrix.

They are taught using examples taken from classroom and non-classroom settings and situations. Staff members model and role-play in order to teach new skills and reinforce expected behaviors. Opportunities will be provided to students to practice expected behaviors. The Cool Tool activities were taught during the first week of school.

The team decided which Cool Tools to teach based on behaviors outlined on the Behavior Matrix. As data is collected throughout the year, it will drive the decisions of what Cool Tools need to be re-taught and reinforced.

Jay Bucks and Redemption

Jay Bucks are used to reinforce positive behavior. They are small blue coupons of paper. When a student is seen displaying positive Jay Stream behavior, they may be given a Jay Buck by a staff member. Students should put their name on the Jay Buck and keep them. Each month, students are able to redeem their Jay Buck(s) for reward(s). The redemption schedule will occur on specified Fridays (or Thursday) during Advisory period. Only students exchanging Jay Bucks will be allowed down to the redemption area.

Celebrations

School-Wide Celebrations will take place once a trimester. The purpose of the school-wide celebrations is to have the entire Jay Stream Community (staff, students and parents) come together to celebrate and recognize accomplishments. Examples of possible celebrations include but are not limited to ice cream socials, whole school movies, assemblies, game day, students vs. staff activities. We are looking forward to the celebrations that will occur this year. The tentative dates are set up August 30, November 22, February 21, and May 30.

Student Dress Requirements

Students have the right to dress and groom according to the guidance provided by their parents/guardians and their own personal taste as long as it does not present health, safety hazards, or substantially disrupt the educational environment or learning process.

Students are responsible to dress in a neat and attractive manner that reflects pride in themselves and their school. If a student's manner of dress is determined to be inappropriate, he or she will be asked to call home and change into suitable clothes.

Skirts, tank tops, shirts, pants, or short shorts, deemed immodest or distracting may not be worn. Clothing should be of appropriate length with no holes. Students' skin should be covered from shoulder to just above the knee. Approximately 2 to 3 inches above the knee and/or the end of your finger tips if your arms are extended all the way down while standing upright.

Coats and headwear (such as hats, bandanas, or sweatbands) may not be worn in the school and must be stored in the hall lockers during the school day. Exceptions may be made by administration for religious or health reasons.

Footwear, which damages school floors, may not be worn. Shoes may not have a soft sole (slippers).

Students may not display or wear clothing displaying obscenities, gang/satanic cult symbols, racial slurs/prejudicial references, which are sexually suggestive, or promoting violence, alcohol, tobacco products, and other drugs.

Students may not wear sunglasses in the building unless medically directed to do so. Chains, pointed or sharp objects may not be worn in school (applies to both males and females).

Clothing that may cause unsafe situations in the classroom or hallways, such as untied shoelaces, wide and/or excessive lengths in pants may not be worn.

The prime responsibility for proper dress is that of the parent/guardian and students. The teacher/team will handle minor violations of our dress code by discussing it with the student and calling parents either at home or work. A teacher/team will refer students to the school administration if there are continual violations of this dress code. If a student wears articles of clothing that are determined to be a health or safety hazard, or substantially disruptive to the educational process, the student will be immediately sent to the school administration for appropriate consequences.

Referral Forms

Although our staff at Jay Stream strives to reinforce the correct behaviors that we want our student to display, there are times that students do not follow the Jayhawk Way. When students are not following the JSMS expectations, a staff member will fill out a referral form to document the incorrect behavior that occurred. This data is helpful to the JSMS staff because it informs us of what behaviors need to be re-taught. The following page is an example of the referral form.

Parent Involvement

In order for PBIS to be successful at Jay Stream, your assistance is imperative!!

Below is a list of suggestions of how you can help support PBIS:

- 1. Remind your child of the Jayhawk expectations on a daily basis (before leaving for school is a great time to review these): **Be Ready, Show Respect, Take Pride.**
- 2. Use the same language that is being used at the school with your child. Review the JSMS behavior matrix.
- 3. Each week ask your student if they received any Jay Bucks and how they earned them. Reinforce the positive behaviors that they are showing at school.
- 4. If you are contacted because your child has not followed the Jayhawk expectations, please review the JSMS behavior expectations at home.

Working together as a PBIS community will help our students

continue to be successful at Jay Stream!
